

OLD FOLK'S HOME PLAN REJECTED

_Illustrated above is the Queen Street aspect of the proposed home for 32 old people on a Queen Street site, opposite Holdsworth Street.

On October 30, Woollahra Council rejected the Society of St. Vincent de Paul's outline plan for the home, following the strong opposition of a number of Queen Street residents.

At our Association's general meeting in September, details of the plan were given by the architect, Mr. W. Atkinson, and a representative of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, Mr. H. Welch.

The following is an extract from a letter commenting on the plan

which the Association sent to Mr. Welch:

"In itself, your proposal to build a home for the aged has our fullest approval. Like Goodwin Village, it could become a valued part of this community.

"However, in looking over the plans submitted, we are concerned that your proposal is in contradiction with the quality and harmony of scale we wish to preserve and enhance in this area.

"The building as proposed, using the maximum plot ratio, is institutional and boxlike, with

ANOTHER TOUCH OF VICTORIANA

Established in 1888, Olson's Ocean Street Pharmacy is one of the oldest in Sydney. Jules Opit, who has just bought it, intends to turn it back into an old-fashioned Victorian pharmacy.

He has begun by repainting the frontage in a specially-created mauve/chocolate colour and giving the windows an attractive arched effect.

If Council approves his plans, two doctors' surgeries will be added at the rear, and the pharmacy extended to provide a ligger dispensary.

The unusual arched awning over the pavement will be retained, as will the original cedar and marble fittings, and the windows will be divided into small panes like a genuine Victorian shop.

minimal design expression, and would be unsympathetic to the residential surroundings it intends to join ...

"Your proposal, we feel, would be alien to the residential character of the neighbourhood, its scale and its visual quality.

"We would prefer the design to express a more residential concept as against the institutional aspect. Details, such as fenestration, the flat roof fascia, are reminiscent of the thirties.

"We are all most anxious that any scheme on this scale should be a happy and compatible one for the new residents it would bring into the area, and we feel that it is most important to integrate not only the building but its inhabitants into the community."

Our Association decided not to make
any comment to Council unless sufficient
members indicated their opposition to the
scheme. In rejecting it, the Council
has invited the applicant to confer with
the Principal Planning Officer, and the
Association will keep a close watch on
future applications for the site.
