


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
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LAND VALUATION DEBACLE

ACCORDING TO the Valuer General values in Woollahra have plummeted six per cent. Yet this has occurred when property values are booming. Mayor John Comino said that nearly all challenges to the 1997-8 valuations achieved significant reductions and that 'silvertail' Woollahra was unfairly targeted. He says that these 2002 valuations are now realistic.

But the problem is that land tax has already been paid by some owners on the hitherto unrealistic values and they are agitating for a refund.

"Woollahra is the only municipality in NSW where there has been an average 6% reduction", said Mr Singer of David Lander Stewart, Solicitors. The director general of the NSW Department of Information Technology and Management says the property market has declined in the wealthier areas and risen out west where lower prices attract first home buyers

After the debacle in February when 370 assessments were issued incorrectly much to the embarrassment of the Office of State Revenue, we are not confident in the voracity of this statement.

Centennial Park

PLANS FOR parking meters in Centennial Park have been scrapped. The community reaction to this proposal was an unequivocal NO and Premier Bob Carr and the Centennial and Moore Park Trust have capitulated.

CYCLISTS WILL not be going against the car traffic in Grand Drive. This proposal was also rejected because of community pressure.

Doggie Power

FEDERATION VALLEY is again offleash for dogs for a twelve- month trial. To protect the pavilion they are prohibited in the area marked off by the stone circle. The Dog Minders Association has volunteered not to walk dogs in the valley, so it is now restricted to individual dog owners. Seems like a sensible solution all round.





Overhead cables

It's about time that leafy Woollahra put its power lines underground. Energy Australia's recent Sydney-wide butchering of trees by cutting out the central canopy has been well documented. The horrific February storms wreaked chaos over Sydney and added to the problem.

At last Councils all over Sydney are looking for a better solution. Some, such as North Sydney, Sutherland and Waverly Councils are considering 'bundling' four or more cables together to make one thick one. Energy Australia charges councils \$990 for each 40 metre span. This seems to be a very temporary and unsatisfactory solution. Who wants unsightly big black cables festooning the streets of Woollahra?

In an attempt to appease public anger at their appalling tree 'trimming' Energy Australia has come up with a list of trees suitable for planting under power lines. Too late for Woollahra, and anyhow we like our great trees shading the streets. What would Queen Street be like without its magnificent trees?

The only solution is to put the cables underground. The mayor of Ashfield has called for a Sydney-wide levy on each household to pay for this. Clover Moore agrees that the only viable long-term solution for mature trees at risk is underground cables.

Come on Mayor Comino. Your one-year term is nearly up. Make a real aesthetic contribution to Woollahra before you leave your post by getting the ball rolling. Start agitating to get the cables underground. The Council spent \$14 million of ratepayer's money on the new Council Chambers. We know there'll be some sort of levy, but allocate some of our rates to pay for something we really need. You'll go down in Council history. *Annette Robinson*

LAND AND ENVIRONMENT COURT

When Councillors start scrapping amongst themselves about Development Application approvals what chance the poor ordinary resident? Councillor Mark Watts, a member of the Liberal team, and his wife Alison Cobden Jones took action in the Land and Environment Court to try to overturn the DA consent to a \$14 million story building next door to their home in Guilfoyle Ave, Double Bay.

They claimed that the approved building broke the size limits of he Council's own local environment plan (LEP) and development control plan (DCP) by writing special urban design guidelines for the site. "The developer rewrote the rules" said L&E Judge Terry Sheahan seeking to clarify the case against the Council.

The judge found for the Council, and it looks as if Councillor Watts and his wife will be out of pocket for legal costs. In September 2001 Councillor Watts resigned from the liberal team and is now an independent.

PARKING METERS

PARKING METERS will be installed in April in Oxford Street, Paddington and Double Bay's commercial centre. The Council has accepted a solar powered model with a smart card facility. The charge will be \$3 per hour including GST. The cost will be \$600 000 in Oxford Street and \$50 000 in Paddington. An alternative, without meters, was rejected at this stage as the NSW Government does not permit the issuing of electronic infringement notices.

Judging by the incredible degree of damage to meters in the Bondi Beach area it would seem prudent to speed up an alternative to meters. The cost to Waverly Council for fixing this constant vandalism must be more than they receive in revenue.

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

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

New Look for Queen Street

Arecent article by Terry Ingram in the Financial Review has highlighted the changing face of Queen Street businesses.

The closure of two antique dealer's show rooms, Hamish Clark and Andre and Cecile Fink, was due to a slow down in antique dealing and an unlikely change in customer's tastes or attitudes in the immediate future. The high rents of the leased shops adding to the problem with Mr Clark paying \$6,000 a month and Andre and Cecile Fink paying \$7,850 a month.

Other dealers in the street, Perryman Oriental Carpets, Howell and Howell, Bradshaw Antiques, Ros Palmer Interiors and GL Auchinachie and Son, have beaten the rent hikes by buying their own buildings but have had to pay up to \$2 million for the privilege.

Rents have risen hugely in expectation that Queen Street would become an extension of Oxford Street. Long-term commercial residents have expressed doubts hat the rents being asked will be sustained by the new businesses being courted to pay them. A number of empty commercial premises currently in the street would lay testimony to that.

Auction houses have piggy backed on the street's success by establishing their Sydney head offices here and many members of the antiques trade believe that competition from the auction houses has added to the down turn in business.

One dealer has stated that 'There is not enough foot traffic and more astute frock and olive shop proprietors have turned down premises in the street on that basis'.

This would be news to the café and coffee house owners. With the opening of Crème Anglaise under the trees at the corner of Queen and Moncur Streets and Pan Darte across the road, joining the established Zigolinis, Agostini's and Adam's, this new culture has brought many people back to the area. It was not long ago with the closure of the Queen Street banks that the street was very quiet and trade was down. The new cafés have not taken business away from the established premises and it would appear that Double Bay may be losing patronage.

The ever popular Orson & Blake and the newer arte flowers have also added to the increase of shoppers to the street. Their brand of homewares, fashion and gift ideas is very popular with their younger clientele and also the not so young.

While a transformation into the fashion dominated Oxford Street strip is undesirable, the current mix of antiques, art galleries, fashion, food stores, cafés, gift ware and essential community services appears to be the right blend of something for everyone.

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

A delightful studio shop, **Fine Mosaics**, has opened on the corner of Wallis Street and Bowden Lane. Proprietor Helen Stewart, pro-



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
